What to Expect

Culture: Portugal has a rich cultural heritage, with a blend of traditional and modern influences. Expect a laid-back lifestyle, friendly locals, and a strong emphasis on family and community.

Cuisine: Portuguese cuisine is diverse, with fresh seafood, rich pastries (like Pastel de Nata), and hearty meats. Don't miss trying the famous bacalhau (salted cod).

Language

Portuguese is the official language. English is widely spoken in tourist areas, major cities, and among the younger population. Learning a few basic Portuguese phrases can enhance your travel experience.

Currency

The official currency of Portugal is the Euro $(\mathbf{\ell})$. It's advisable to carry some cash, especially when visiting smaller towns, though credit and debit cards are widely accepted in major cities and tourist areas.

Time Zone

Portugal operates on Western European Time (WET), which is the same as Greenwich Mean Time (GMT). During Daylight Saving Time (from the last Sunday in March to the last Sunday in October), the clocks move forward one hour, making it Western European Summer Time (WEST), or GMT+1.



Plug Adaptor

Portugal uses Type C and F electrical outlets, with a standard voltage of 230V and a frequency of 50Hz. If your devices use a different plug type, you'll need a plug adaptor.

Airport Locations

Lisbon Airport (Humberto Delgado Airport - LIS): The main international gateway, located just 7 km from Lisbon's city center.

Porto Airport (Francisco Sá Carneiro Airport - OPO): About 11 km from Porto's city center, serving northern Portugal.

Faro Airport (FAO):

Located 4 km west of Faro, mainly serving the Algarve region.

Madeira Airport (Cristiano Ronaldo Airport - FNC): Situated near Funchal, catering to the Madeira archipelago.

Driving Rules

The driving rules in Portugal are quite similar to other parts of western Europe. Portuguese traffic drives on the right-hand side of the road.

- You must also give way to traffic coming from the right unless there are signs that indicate otherwise.
- Take stop signs seriously and always make a full stop. If you don't come to a complete halt, you can be fined.
- When driving on a toll motorway, be sure to stay in the correct lanes because green lanes are reserved for vehicles fitted with an automatic toll-pay device.
- Unlike some countries, drivers in Portugal do not flash their lights to give way; in fact, it means the exact opposite!
